Making Models out of Stone

When we joined the Mount Gravatt Lapidary Club we enjoyed the challenge of changing a dull ordinary rock into a lovely cabochon. Les went on to do faceting, I joined in the Silver classes and made earrings and pendants with the cabs.

At the show each year we marvelled at Jim Mattsrelli's models that he entered into the Lionel Whitby Trophy competition. I started making small silver miniatures, and Les made some small models out of different rocks, then I started working with rocks too.

At last year's Waterloo Bay Show I was delighted to see two of Lionel Whitby's models (the Lighthouse and the Church). Though I had heard of them, I didn't know they were so big. Although our models are smaller, in my mind I think we are achieving a standard both Jim and Lionel would approve of.

To begin Modelling

For me it takes a lot of time with pencil and paper. I draw out each piece, specify size and how many of each I need but the general steps are the same for each project:

Decide on a subject, scale it down to the size you want.

Check that you have enough material to make what you want.

Cut your rock to the sizes you need eg 4mm square x 16mm long, 2mm thick slab 15mm x 20 mm.

Shape your pieces with trim saw, wheels and Dremel. Polish.

Then the fun starts as you glue the pieces together. Some projects need to be fitted and glued as you go.

Some you complete all pieces, then roughen the surfaces to be glued, so when set, the project is finish.

To help assemble your project you may need to be creative and make wedges and frames to hold the things in place while the glue set.



I find it easier to have a picture or model to check your progress against.

Be prepared to make changes, to compensate for the inflexible nature of rocks

For my birdhouse, for example, I selected a slab of gympieite for the base to represent grass, Petrified Wood for the pole and supports, Gympieite for the platform and roof, Himalayan Marble for the walls of the birdhouse. The birds were mostly Agate, ground to the appropriate shapes. After cutting and polishing all the pieces, I assembled as follows.

glue the house together

fit the base supports to the pole, making sure it is exactly vertical

then the top supports to the underside of the platform

glue the two together, this time making sure the platform is level

glue to "grass" base

place 1 bird in the house and glue to platform

arrange other birds where they look right

always leaving time between each stage for it to set firm.

Rock Tumbling

This kind of hobby is suitable for anybody who has an interest in exposing the natural shine and colour of various types of semi-precious gemstones. It is an ideal way to begin your exploration of the lapidary arts..

The tumbling of rock is a lapidary technique consisting of one or more barrels containing rock and abrasive rotating on a frame that also holds the motor and shaft. An electric motor provides power to one or both shafts by a pulley and belt.

A rotating barrel tumbler, when properly filled with rock, water, and abrasive media, imitates a cascading waterfall where water swirls, bounces and slides over the streambed. The barrel's rotation lifts the rock pieces up the sidewall where they then slide and tumble in a cascading fashion down the top surface of the rock and abrasive media.

Typically, a full tumble polish from rough rock, to polish takes between 10 to 14 weeks (this may be shorter with soft rock) and is done in 5 steps. Step one is grinding and shaping with 60/90 abrasive. Step two is smoothing the surface with 120/220 abrasive. Step three is further smoothing with 600 abrasive. Step 4 is pre-polish with 1200 abrasive. Step five is polish with Tin Oxide or Cerium Oxide.

LAPIDARY

What is Lapidary?

Lapidary is the craft of collecting, cutting & polishing of precious, semi-precious & other attractive stones for the purpose of display, ornamentation or for jewellery.

History Lapidary has its origins when Stone Age man first needed tools and weapons and began selecting stones and shaping them for this purpose, tens of thousands of years ago. Through the ages special stones also became symbols of worship, jewellery and adornments. The early Egyptians subsequently developed techniques for cutting and polishing stones as hard as quartz and amethyst as can be seen in the items found in the Egyptian Tombs.

Our modern day lapidary hobbyists are the present day custodians of these ancient lapidary skills.

VIV DADOW'S association with the club

Viv Dadow was a founding member of the club as it is today. He owned The Rock Shop in Brisbane and later moved to Cooperoo. Viv enjoyed fossicking, cutting and polishing his finds and the social side that went with the activities. Viv obviously enjoyed carving as can be seen by the pieces on display in the club house today. Viv was President of the club in the founding years but due to commitments had to give up committee but remained an active member until the late 80's.

FROM the 25th YEAR BOOK

Mt Gravatt Lapidary Society started off as "The Lithophilic Society – Mt Gravatt Branch" on the 4th February 1964 at a meeting convened by Viv Dadow and Stan Deem.

Viv had been a member of the 1st Lithophilic Society, which was founded on 1st January 1963. This was mainly a social club and Viv felt it would a good idea to form a working club which would hold field trips, where members could cut and polish the material they found on these trips. He was joined by Stan who was associated with the Lapidary Section of the Gemmological Association of Australia, and was experienced in lapidary work.

Viv was the first President of the Society and Stan Deem the chief instructor. Viv remained President for 2 years and an active member for 25 years plus, time permitting from his Rock shop in the city.
